

Dr. Jordan R. Humphrey



Dr. Jordan R. Humphrey is the daughter of Richard and Dawn Humphrey of Allenwood where she grew up with sister, Shannyn. Graduating from Warrior Run with the Class of 1999, Jordan was active in athletic and extracurricular activities as well as excelling academically. Jordan was a member of the concert choir and show choir and participated in District and Regional Chorus. She also was a member of the AFS Club, the Tri-Hi-Y Club, YEA, the Spanish Club, and the National Honor Society. Jordan was on the honor and distinguished honor rolls during all four years of high school. In addition, she played field hockey, was the football and basketball statistician, was a member of the Varsity Club, and participated on the track and field team, winning the Deb Eisenhard Memorial Track Award as a senior. She was also named the Outstanding Defensive Player in field hockey her senior year. Jordan served as a student athletic sports trainer in a cooperative program with Susquehanna Health System and Warrior Run.

In 1999, Jordan continued her education, attending Franklin and Marshall College in Lancaster, PA, graduating in 2003 with a Bachelor of Arts in Spanish, Government, and Music Performance. Jordan spent a semester abroad at the Royal Holloway and Bedford New College, University of London, London, England during her junior year. Active in all phases of college life, Jordan participated in college choir, chamber singers, was a student athletic trainer, threw discus and shot on the track and field team, and tutored ESL students at Wheatland Middle School. She was inducted into Pi Sigma Alpha Political Science Honor Society and Sigma Delta Pi Spanish Honor Society. As part of her course work, she and another student completed a legal brief that led to political asylum for a Haitian refugee. After graduation, Jordan worked as the Associate Director of the Center for Liberal Arts and Society at Franklin and Marshall while pursuing her Master of Science in Education at the University of Pennsylvania in Philadelphia. The focus for her master's degree, which she earned in 2006, was Higher Education Administration. In 2011, Jordan was honored with the Emerging Scholars Award and Fellowship from Franklin and Marshall.

Jordan continued her education at The Pennsylvania State University in 2006, beginning work on her Ph.D. in Higher Education. While she was at Penn State, Jordan received the S. V. and Carrie Martorana Family Research Award and the Higher Education Program Alumni Fellowship. She was a research assistant at the Center for the Study of Higher Education where she assisted the staff with a variety of research and scholarly projects. In the Division of Outreach and Engagement, Jordan led the FOCUS research project funded by the W. K. Kellogg Foundation. In addition, she worked at Rankin and Associates Consulting, Howard, PA, developing reports for various colleges and universities. Jordan earned her Ph. D. in 2010 with the completion of her dissertation: *Liberal Arts Colleges in the Tumultuous 1940s: Institutional Identity and the Challenges of War and Peace*.

After graduation, Jordan joined the faculty of St Mary's University in San Antonio, Texas as the Assistant Director for Service Learning in the Civic Engagement and Career Development Center where she supported faculty in the creation of new courses in service learning and civic engagement, providing workshops, seminars and materials for their use. In 2012, Dr. Humphrey became the Associate Director for Civic Engagement at the Center where she leads current efforts and future directions of the Center's civic engagement initiatives among other duties. Jordan also is an Adjunct Professor in the School of Humanities and Social Sciences at St. Mary's and at the University of Texas at San Antonio in the Education Leadership and Policy Studies Graduate Program. In addition, she serves as a Consultant at Palo Alto College in San Antonio. Jordan is the author or co-author of several publications and has given numerous presentations, both refereed and non-refereed, at various conferences.

Jordan is a member of numerous committees at the college and serves as the chair of four of them. She teaches a variety of courses at St. Mary's and at UT San Antonio. She is a member of the following groups: Association for the Study of Higher Education, History of Education Society, American Educational Research Association, National Association of Student Personnel Administrators, and International Association for Research on Service Learning and Community Engagement. Jordan is a committee member on the AERA Graduate Student Paper Awards Committee, and a reviewer for the Penn State University Press, the Journal of Higher Education Outreach and Engagement, and Higher Education in Review.

As an active member of her community, Jordan volunteers for Meals on Wheels, Each One Teach One Adult and Family Literacy Program, and the San Antonio Youth Literacy Program. She also is a choir member of the First Presbyterian Church of San Antonio, a member of the San Antonio Road Runners and is President of the South Central Texas Chapter of the Penn State Alumni Association. Jordan is an avid runner, having completed two half marathons over the last year and is currently training for a third in November.

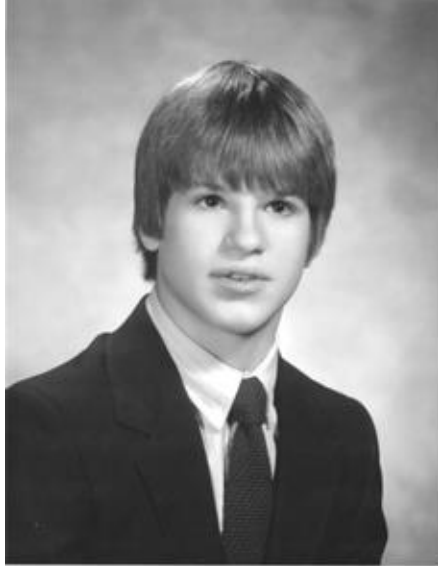
